



U4CA is a set of techniques intended to improve one's writing skill. This is composed of Unity, Coherence, Conciseness, Clarity, Concreteness, and Accuracy. The use of U4CA in paragraph writing allows for a more efficient and effective delivery of thought through writing.



Below are the characteristics of a...

1. United paragraph

- The paragraph starts with a topic sentence. This sentence contains the major idea of the whole paragraph.
- All sentences in the paragraph must be related to the idea of the topic sentence and contribute to a deeper understanding of the topic sentence.
- Remember: Stay on topic.

2. Coherent paragraph


 The ideas in the paragraph are logically ordered. Common patterns of paragraph organization are time or chronological order, space or spatial order, breakdown order, and relationship order.

Paragraph Organization	Description
Chronological Order	Describes a sequence of events, explains how a process works, or traces causes and effects.
Spatial Order	Describes a scene.
Breakdown Order	Analyzes a body of data and breaks it down into a set of categories.
Relationship Order	Compares and contrasts.

- There is a **repetition of key words** to keep the reader focused on the topic. Also, this maintains consistency in how the ideas are presented.
- The use of transitional words and phrases is present to maintain the flow of the paragraph. Below are some **transitional words or phrases** for different situations.

3. Concise paragraph

- Most effective and direct-to-the-point words are used.
- Weak or unnecessary words are deleted or replaced with more powerful and specific ones.
- Below are examples of wordy and concise sentences (Purdue University, n.d.):



4. Clear paragraph

- Clear and descriptive words are used while vague and unclear words are avoided.
- Clichés are avoided because they alienate readers who are not familiar with the phrase.
- Active voice is used, and passive voice is avoided (e.g., "Researchers selected the sample" is preferred over "The sample was selected.").

5. Concrete paragraph

- Makes use of concrete language more than abstract language.
 Concrete language refers to words that are tangible and known through our senses. Examples are "35 degrees Celsius," "thin Persian cat," and "deep spruce green."
- Makes use of specific more than general language. For example, instead of using the word "a university sports team," one can specifically refer to "the FEU Tamaraws Men's Football Team."
- Statements are also evidence-based and are substantially supported by specific facts and examples.
- The table below is the Ladder of Abstraction (ISU Writing Center, 2016).
 This can help writers to classify words on a scale or continuum depending on their level of abstraction. The lower the level or number, the more specific the word is

6. Accurate paragraph



UNITY

 This means that all sentences in the paragraph are related to the topic sentence and are focused on a single idea.

CONCISENESS

• This is the use of the most effective and direct-to-the-point words in a paragraph.

CLARITY

 This is the use of clear and descriptive language in a paragraph.

ACCURACY

 This is the reliability, truthfulness, and correctness of the content.

- The paragraph is reliable, truthful, and correct in terms of content.
- The following questions can be used to validate the accuracy of a paragraph or a written work (Kurpiel, 2023):
 - Where does the information come from?
 - Is the information supported by evidence?
 - Has the information been reviewed or refereed?
 - Can you verify any of the information in another source or from personal knowledge?
 - Does the language or tone seem biased and free of emotion?
 - Are there spelling, grammar, or other typographical errors?

KEY IDEAS

- Clear and descriptive words are used while vague and unclear words are avoided.
- Clichés are avoided because they alienate readers who are not familiar with the phrase.
- Active voice is used, and passive voice is avoided (e.g., "Researchers selected the sample" is preferred over "The sample was selected.").

COHERENCE

 All ideas in the paragraph are logically organized and flow smoothly from one idea to the next.

CONCRETENESS

• This is the use of specific and sensory-based words in a paragraph

SEVEN STEPS



This sentence should contain the controlling idea that you want to be supported by the next sentences.

WRITE THE NEXT SENTENCES Ensure that the next sentences are related to the topic sentence.

CHECK THE ORDER OF THE SENTENCES It should be logically arranged to help with the reader's comprehension of the idea.



IMPROVE THE FLOW OF THE PARAGRAPH

Use transitional words or phrases to advance the coherence of the paragraph.

EXAMINE THE WORDS USED Make sure that clear, specific, effective, and descriptive words and phrases are used.

ANALYZE THE ACCURACY from?" and "Does the language seem biased?"

> **READ THROUGH** Read through the whole paragraph and double-check if all techniques are effectively used.

Good Example

FEU students can log in to their Canvas account through Microsoft Office 365 (Reyes, 2021). First, students must visit the log-in page of Microsoft Office 365. Next, they need to enter their username and password. The format of their username should be studentnumber@feu.edu.ph. Afterthat, in the Office 365 portal, they must click to show all applications. Finally, students need to select the FEU Canvas Icon to open the application. Once these steps are done, students can now access the Canvas application and start their schoolwork.

DESCRIPTIONS/EXPLANATIONS

Needs Improvement

Unity- Some sentences are not directly related to the topic sentence and its controlling idea.

oherence- Sequence of events is confusing and transitional words or phrases are not present. Conciseness- Vague and dead weight words are used in the

paragraph. Clarity - The paragraph used unclear words and passive voice that

make the subject unclear. Words used are not specific and not easily

understood. Accuracy - Opinion is present in the paragraph which shows biased content. There is also no proof that the information is accurate or has been reviewed.


Good Example

Unity- The topic sentence is present, and all sentences are related to its controlling idea.

Coherence- Proper sequence of events and the use of transitional words or phrases are present.

Conciseness Direct-to-the-point words are used in the paragraph. larity- The paragraph used clear words and the active voice which make the subject clear.

oncreteness - Words used are specific and easily understood. Accuracy- The information came from a reliable source and the paragraph is free from typographical and grammatical errors.

Step 3- Draw the two ears from the head.


Step 4- Draw an oval nose and add a little "banana" looking tail.

Possible answer:

Facebook and Instagram have similarities and differences that can be useful or disadvantageous depending on the user. For the similarities, both applications can post videos and images, and can share feed posts, stories, reels, and multiple photos at once. In addition, users can leave comments and like someone's post in both applications. As for their differences, in terms of post structure, Facebook can post images, videos, and text together or individually while Instagram can only post visual content with written captions. Text-only posts are not allowed. Also, Facebook has a feature that allows users to play games while Instagram does not. Another difference is in the line of desktop and mobile optimization; Facebook is both desktop and mobile-friendly whereas Instagram is more mobile-friendly. Both applications have interesting features that can be useful depending on the needs and demands of the netizens.


